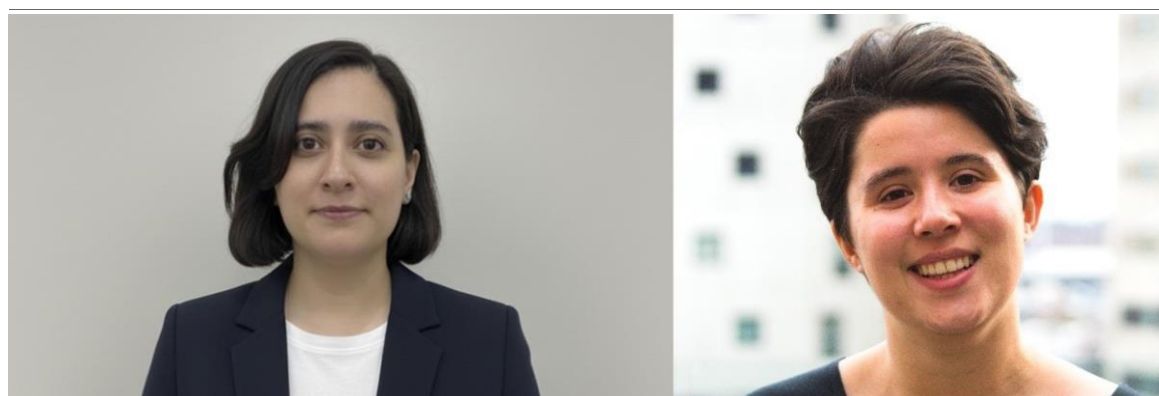

Bedford Centre for the History of Women and Gender Annual Lecture
Queens in the North: Elite women, social networks, & the world of the sagas
Wednesday 3 December, 5:30-7.30pm, Central London

A vivid reconstruction of Scandinavia's Viking Age past can be gleaned from the Old Norse kings' sagas, and the distinctive place of women in their internal political scene still holds some surprises. In this talk Markus Eldegard Mindrebø (University of Stavanger) draws on his recent research on Snorri Sturluson's *Heimskringla* and other sagas to explore their vision of royal and aristocratic women as protagonists who used social networks, interpersonal bonds, and political rituals to play the political game and claim political influence on par with men.
